When A.H. Orr Lodge opened in 1978 the Bethel complex catered for 127 residents across self-care units, the hostel & the nursing home and 80 staff.

The facility had grown to a medium sized business and managing it was becoming increasingly complex. Eventually the shift was made from Administrator to Chief Executive.

Societal expectations and modern health improvements were demanding improvements of a quantum advance.

The 'old school' matrons were not enamoured with the growing profession of the CEO.

After years of planning and government lobbying for grants, the next grand vision of Bethel was finally realised. On 14 August 1997, residents moved into the current Bethel Nursing home.

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How long have you lived at ABH?

12 months at the end of August

Where did you grow up?

I was born in 1932 in Burwood and lived in southern and mid-western NSW including Mimosa, Wattamondara and Illabo until I was 17. My father was a teacher and he taught at small country schools, so we moved around a bit. He taught me until I was 7. I went to High School in Cootamundra and did my leaving Certificate there in 1949.

Tell us about your parents

I'm a long-term Aussie and only child, born here and lived here all my life. My parents and three of my grandparents were all born here, and my grandmother came here when she was four. My mother's family is from Scotland and my father's family is from England. My great grandfather worked as a gardener in Queen Victoria's royal household.

I married my wife Rita in 1964. We've been married for 56 years, and we have two daughters, two sons-in law and four grandsons. We all regularly connect via Zoom (at the moment) or visits.

What was your first job?

I worked in a menswear shop in Cootamundra while at school. Then I studied engineering at UNSW, during its



very early days. Doing survey work on Warragamba Dam in 1951 was one of my first jobs as an undergraduate for 6 weeks.

I had a long and varied working life, worked for NSW Government for 2.5 years, in Sydney's Head Office for 12 months, then in Hay in the Riverina. After that I left Public Works and worked with engineering contractors for some 10 years before returning to Public Works when I retired in 1992. I worked on many projects including a wharf in Western Australia, a steelworks in England, a dam in Canberra and a road in northern Queensland.

Most interesting thing you have done

In 1963/64 I built 40 miles of road and 8 bridges in the Gulf of Carpentaria. We went over there 15 years ago and they're still there.

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Greatest achievement?

Marriage to Rita and the happy life we have had. I was on the move from WA to Cairns and stopped off in Brisbane for a week when we met. Rita was nursing there. We spent every night that week out together! Then she came to Cairns with her girlfriend and returned to Perth. I had Christmas dinner with my parents and went to Perth to join her. We got married in October 1964 and lived in Lismore for 6 years and in Sydney since 1979.

Best thing you've ever learned to do

I've been an active sportsman all my life, especially tennis and golf. I played golf until three years ago and still enjoy watching it. Jack Nicklaus was my favourite.

What are your favourite pastimes?

Furniture restoration has been a lifelong hobby. My children inherited some old furniture which I restored, including a big dining room table and a wardrobe with shelving.

Best advice ever given?

When I was 16 my father said I must get a tertiary education. I always liked the idea of studying engineering and I never regretted it. My father was a very interesting person. When I was born, he was 51. He left school at aged 13 and was a WW1 vet.

What is your best memory?

can still remember a lot from the trip. We travelled over 6,000 miles including Vancouver, Washington, Oregon state, San Francisco, LA, Disneyland, the Grand Canyon, Yellowstone, Montana and Banff and Victoria Island.

It brings out the best and worst of people. Most people accept as a fact of life but a small number spoil everything for others.
