






HISTORY OF OUR AREA NAMES: PRATTEN

Pratten is on the first floor of Bethel Lodge. Herbert Edward Pratten (7 May 1865 – 7 May 1928) was a prominent Ashfield businessman and Australian politician born in Gloucestershire, England. At the age of 15, he joined an iron and steel company and was sent to Sydney in 1884 to become a clerk in the firm's new Australian branch.

In 1888, Pratten established a soft drink company in Ashfield and went on to become a prominent local businessman, running a printing company, a jam company and a fruit pulp export company that pioneered newly developed cold-storage techniques.

He served on the Ashfield Municipal Council from 1905 to 1912, including as Mayor from 1909 to 1911.

In June 1924, he was appointed Minister for Trade and Customs and Minister for Health. Pratten was considered a strong protectionist. He believed that the economic growth of Asia was both a threat and an opportunity for Australia and recommended that the federal government place trade commissions in Calcutta and Shanghai.

In 1906, Ashfield Council established Pratten Park, incorporating land from the local a'Beckett family estate. The first incarnation of the Bethel Rest Home was the original a'Beckett family home.

Say hello to ...

RESIDENT MARGARET DUNSMORE

How long have you lived at ABH?

Ten months. Before here I lived at Cardinal Freeman for thirty years. I wanted to move because they didn't have any care support for the night-time. I was happy to move because it made things easier for me. It was my idea to move into Cardinal Freeman, and my idea to move here. I knew about ABH from when my husband Neville lived here, the staff were wonderful to him and he never complained.

Where did you grow up?

I grew up in Haberfield, but I was born in Young. When I was 71, twelve years ago, I found out that my sister and I were adopted. I decided I wanted a copy of my baptism certificate, but I could never get it. I never needed it for my marriage or first communion and I never applied for a passport. My mother kept everything and never told us. I eventually found out through DOCS. I went to primary school at St. Joan of Arc in Haberfield, but I only saw the first year of high school at Domremy College. I broke my ankle at school one day and then my other ankle when I came home, so that was the end of school for me.



What was your first job?

I worked in Coles, in the Australian Arcade. Miss Stanley was always very good to me. I started on the checkout, and gradually worked my way up to answer the bells. I stayed until I got married, then we had three children. After they started school my sister got me a job at Coles in Leichhardt. I went on to work at K-Mart in Ashfield, but I've only ever had one employer.

Tell us about your family

My parents were the best people, we couldn't have asked for a better upbringing. Dad was English and Mum was from the country.

My sister Mary Cecilia (Molly) was born at St. Margaret's, so she was adopted from Croydon. We had the most beautiful upbringing. We were very fortunate. I was a very sick child with terrible bronchitis. Once when I was six years old, all the nuns put my bed into the middle of the ward and stood round it praying for me. I still remember it clearly.

Molly and I were adopted at the same time. She lives in Adelaide, but we still speak twice a week.

Neville and I got married on May 2nd, 1959. We were married for 56 years. We had three babies in three years -Glenn, Wayne, and Donna. Glenn is recently married, and Donna lives in Cootamundra with her husband. Wayne lives in Perth with his wife and three children. Neville and I were pretty strict with them, I'd be in jail today!

What do you enjoy?

I have a very strong faith. I enjoy the services that Kathy (the Chaplain) does here.

I made all my Christmas decorations, they are either crocheted or knitted. And I made the rug on my bed. I've had them all for years and treasure them, I made them, so I love them. My son puts them out every Christmas.

Best piece of advice

Look after your family and they will look after you.

Best memory

Growing up with my parents and sister.

Favourite holiday

Neville was from Wingen, near Scone. We would visit his family and the kids loved it. They would run alongside the train tracks waving and the train driver would beep the whistle.
